



DOUBLE OBJECT PRONOUNS IN SPANISH

Key Point

 Double object pronouns occurs when we use direct and indirect object pronouns at the same time.



Tina me prestó estos vestidos. Tina lent me these dresses.



Tina me los prestó.

Tina lent them to me.

DOUBLE OBJECT PRONOUNS CHART

INDIRECT OBJECT PRONOUNS

Person	IOP
Yo	Me
Tú	Te
Él/Ella	Le (se)
Nosotros	Nos
Vosotros	Os
Ellos / Ustedes	Les (se)

DIRECT OBJECT PRONOUNS

Person	DOP
Yo	Me
Tú	Te
Él/Ella	Lo/La
Nosotros	Nos
Vosotros	Os
Ellos / Ustedes	Los / Las

Note: The DOPs in pink are most common DOPs used in double object pronouns.

DOUBLE OBJECT PRONOUNS EXAMPLES

	With double objects	With double object pronouns
Example #1	Mi mamá nos regaló <u>estas flores</u> . My mom gave us <u>these flowers</u> .	Mi mamá nos <u>las</u> regaló. My mom gave <u>them</u> to us .
Example #2	Nora te mandó <u>el correo</u> ayer. Nora sent <u>the email</u> to you yesterday.	Nora te <u>lo</u> mandó ayer. Nora sent <u>it</u> to you yesterday.
Example #3	Tania le dio <u>estos chocolates</u> a John . Tania gave <u>these chocolates</u> to John .	Tania se <u>los</u> dio a John. Tania gave <u>them</u> to John .

ORDER OF <u>Double object pronouns</u> in spanish

Indirect object pronoun + Direct object pronoun

BEFORE THE VERB

- Conjugated verbs.
- Perfect tenses.
- Negative commands.

Yo te la regalé (that bag). I gave it to you (that bag).



ATTACHED TO THE VERB

- Affirmative commands.
- Infinitive verbs.
- Gerunds.

¡Dámelo! Es mío.

Give it to me! It's mine.

KEY POINTS: DOUBLE OBJECT PRONOUNS IN SPANISH

- Double object pronouns in Spanish are sentences that <u>use both</u> indirect and <u>direct object pronouns</u>.
- We use them to <u>simplify</u> sentences and avoid unnecessary <u>repetition</u>.
- In a sentence with double object
 pronouns, <u>Spanish indirect object</u>

 <u>pronouns always come before</u> the direct object.
- The order of double object pronouns depends on the type of verb you're using.

- Spanish double object pronouns are <u>attached</u> to the verb in <u>affirmative</u> <u>commands</u>, <u>present participles</u>, or <u>infinitive verbs</u>.
- They must be placed <u>before the</u>
 <u>conjugated verb</u> in <u>negative commands</u>,
 perfect tenses, or sentences with a single verb.
