HOW TO USE 'HAY' IN SPANISH

POINT OUT EXISTENCE

Describes the objects within a place.



Hay dos libros en el tocador.

There are two books in the dresser.

EXPRESS OBLIGATION

Communicates <u>impersonal</u> obligations.



<u>Hay que</u> limpiar las escobas. <u>We have to</u> clean the brooms.

POINT OUT EXISTENCE - <u>HAY</u> IN <u>SPANISH</u>

ADD DETERMINERS

You can use determiners to provide extra information about the noun.

Indefinite articles - un, una, unos, unas

Quantifiers - mucho, más, poco, demasiado, etc

Numbers - dos, tres, cuatro, etc.

Interrogative words - qué, por qué, dónde

EXAMPLES WITH HAY

Hay works with nouns to state or ask about their existence or presence.

Mamá, ¿hay más pastel?

Mom, is there more cake?

Hay muchos mosquitos en la casa.

There are a lot of mosquitos in the house.

¿Cuántas personas hay?

How many people are there?

EXPRESS OBLIGATION - <u>HAY QUE</u> IN <u>SPANISH</u>

With this structure, hay means "to have to", or "let's do..."

Hay que + [verb in infinitive form]

Hay que ir por un café.

Let's go for a coffee.

No se les olvide que hay que limpiar las ventanas.

Don't forget that we have to clean the windows.

DIFFERENT FORMS <u>OF 'HAY'</u> IN SPANISH

Present

Hay tres camisas.

There are three shirts.

<u>Preterite</u>

No hubo camisas verdes.

There were no green shirts.

<u>Imperfect</u>

Había una rosa. There was a pink one.



Future

Habrán más camisas.

There will be more shirts.

Near future

No van a haber más.

There will be no more.

Conditional

Habría camisas verdes

There would be green shirts.

Present Subjunctive

No creo que haya más camisas.

I don't think there are more shirts.

<u>Past Subjunctive</u>

Ojalá hubiera otras camisas.

I wish there were other shirts.

COMMON PHRASES & IDIOMS WITH HAY

No hay problema

No problem

¿Qué hay?

What's up?

No hay de qué

Don't mention it

¿Qué hay de nuevo?

What's new?

Hay gato encerrado

There's something fishy going on

Eres de los que no hay

You're one in a million

Hay moros en la costa

The coast is not clear

No hay de otra

Have no other choice

Hay tela que cortar

Have things to say / Have things to talk about

Hay pájaros en el alambre

The coast is not clear

KEY POINTS: USING <u>HAY</u> IN SPANISH

- 'Hay' is the <u>impersonal form</u> of 'haber'
- 'Hay' in Spanish means 'there is' or 'there are'.
- Although it's always used in singular form, hay can be conjugated to different tenses.

- This word can be used to express
 <u>obligation</u> or to point out the
 <u>existence/presence</u> of a thing or person
 within a place.
 - Hay que + [infinitive] is the structure
 you must use to express obligation.
 - Hay + [determiner] + noun is the structure used to talk about existence.
