SPANISH 101 CONDITIONAL PERFECT CONJUGATION & USES





FORMING THE <u>CONDITIONAL PERFECT</u> IN SPANISH

EXAMPLE: DORMIR IN CONDITIONAL PERFECT

Person	Conditional forms of haber	+	Past participle	Conditional tense
Yo Tú Él / Ella Nosotros Vosotros Ellos / Ustedes	Habrías Habría Habríamos Habríais Habrían	+	dormido	Yo habría dormido Tú habrías dormido Él/Ella habría dormido Nosotros habríamos dormido Vosotros habríais dormido Ellos/Ustedes habrían dormido

Note: '-ado' and '-ido' are the regular past participle endings for -AR and -ER/IR verbs, respectively.

USES OF THE CONDITIONAL PERFECT

KEY POINTS

- The conditional perfect refers to <u>past</u> wishes or possibilities that <u>never</u> took place.
- It conveys what would have happened if things were done differently.



<u>Habría dormido</u> más, pero tenía mucho trabajo. I <u>would have slept</u> more, but I had a lot of work.

> Nos habría gustado viajar más. We would have liked to travel more.

CONDITIONAL VS CONDITIONAL PERFECT IN SPANISH

CONDITIONAL SIMPLE

Future or present conditions that are <u>unlikely</u> to happen.



<u>Viajaría</u> más si tuviera más tiempo. I <u>would travel</u> more if I had more time.

CONDITIONAL PERFECT

<u>Hypothetical</u> past conditions. Can no longer be achieved.



<u>Habría viajado</u> más si hubiera tenido más tiempo. I <u>would have traveled</u> more if I had had more time.
