









WHAT ARE <u>VERB MOODS</u> IN SPANISH

INDICATIVE

Facts, certainty and reality.



Ella <u>estudia</u> mucho. She <u>studies</u> a lot.

IMPERATIVE

Expresses commands.



¡<u>Estudia</u> un rato más! <u>Study</u> a little more!

SUBJUNCTIVE

<u>Subjective</u>. Hopes, doubts, emotions.



Ojalá Luz <u>estudie</u> bien. I hope Luz <u>studies</u> well.

WHAT IS THE <u>INDICATIVE MOOD</u> IN SPANISH

KEY POINTS

- The indicative mood refers to actions perceived as <u>factual</u> or <u>real</u>.
- This mood has <u>five main tenses</u> with their progressives and perfect forms.
- It can refer to current <u>events</u>, <u>memories</u>, <u>past</u> <u>actions</u>, <u>conditions</u>, and future <u>plans</u>.



A Ken le gusta los perros. Ken likes dogs.

Cuando era niño, quería ser doctor. When I was a child, I wanted to be a doctor.

WHAT IS THE <u>Subjunctive mood</u> in Spanish

KEY POINTS

- It expresses <u>subjectivity</u>.
- It conveys someone's <u>hopes</u>, <u>suggestions</u>, <u>emotions</u>, or <u>doubts</u> about an action.
- Sentences with subjunctive often involve <u>two</u> <u>subjects</u>.
- The subjunctive mood has <u>four tenses</u>: present, past, and their perfect forms.



<u>Espero</u> que Juan me invite a salir. I <u>hope</u> Juan asks me out.

Me gustaría que fuéramos al cine. I'd like us to go to the movies.

WHAT IS THE <u>IMPERATIVE MOOD</u> IN SPANISH

KEY POINTS

- The imperative is used to give commands.
- Commands can be <u>affirmative</u> (what to do) or <u>negative</u> (what not do to).
- The imperative has <u>no tenses</u>.



Limpia tu cuarto. Clean your room.

No hables con extraños. Don't talk to strangers.

TENSES VS MOODS IN SPANISH

SPANISH TENSES

Convey when an action takes place.



<u>Hoy tuvimos</u> una reunión. <u>Today</u>, we <u>had</u> a meeting

SPANISH MOODS

Convey if the action is <u>factual</u>, an <u>order</u>, or <u>subjective</u>.



No creí que fueran a llegar tarde.

I didn't think they were going to be late.

Note: The indicative and subjunctive moods have different tenses.
