DIFFERENCE BETWEEN MUY & MUCHO

MUY

Intensifies qualities.



Pauline tiene un perro **muy** chiquito.
Pauline has a **very** small dog.

Marco come **muy** lento.
Marco eats **very** slowly.

MUCHO

Measures quantities or an action's intensity.



Pauline tiene **muchos** perros.
Pauline has **a lot** of dogs.

Marco come **mucho** y muy rápido.
Marco eats **a lot** and very fast.

WHEN TO USE MUY IN SPANISH

KEY POINTS

- It's an adverb that intensifies qualities. It works with adjectives or other adverbs.
- Combine it with adjectives to intensify how something is.
- With adverbs, it highlights how an action is done.
- Always maintains a single form.



Los boletos están **muy** caros.
The tickets are **very** expensive.

No me siento **muy** bien.
I'm not feeling **very** well.

Note: Do not combine **muy** + **mucho**.

WHEN TO USE MUCHO IN SPANISH

KEY POINTS

- It relates to quantities.
- As an adverb, it expresses the intensity or degree of an action. It goes after a verb.
- As a determiner, it indicates the amount of something. It goes before a noun.
 - It has plural and feminine forms.



Ya no quedan **muchos** boletos.
There are not **many** tickets left.

Juan trabaja **mucho**.
Juan works **a lot**.

Note: When combined with nouns, 'mucho' must mark gender and number.
